## Neighborhood Center honors 5 persons

The Easton Area Neighborhood Center is celebrating its 15th anniversary. Last night the private, nonprofit community organization held an open house in honor of this mile-

A short program included a review of the center's history and the presentation of community service awards to five area persons.

The center was founded in 1967 as a result of two separate events. One involved a survey of youth living on Easton's South Side. The survey was conducted by the Youth Committee of the Easton Area branch of the National Association for the Advancenment of Colored

The survey found a need for a gathering place for young people on the South Side. The City of Easton responded to a request for help by providing the building and playground facilities currently used by the center.

At about the same time, the Community Action movement came to the area with the formation of the Community Action Committee of the Lehigh Valley, Inc. Community Action programs were mandated by the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964 to insure the provision of nectracted with the center to provide at the main office at 902

these services in Easton. This relationship continues today.

The center's goal always has been to increase the independence and self-sufficiency of low-income residents. On the individual level, the center reaches out to people, determines their needs, refers them to appropriate agencies and provides support counseling.

On the group level, it helps in the formation of community groups in its target areas - Delaware Terrace, Kennedy Gardens and Dutchtown/Gallows Hill - and works with them to resolve community prob-

The center also provides community programming for children, adults and senior citizen.

In 1970, members of the South Side community banded together to form the Easton Area Neighborhood Center Federal Credit Union. The credit union has encouraged many area residents to deposit money on a regular basis, and has provided loans to persons who would not be able to borrow elsewhere.

In 1977, the neighborhood center expanded its operations by opening an office in the Dutchtown/Gallows Hill area in support of Easton's reviessary human services to low-talization efforts. The office proincome individuals. CACLV subconvides the same services as available
