First of all let me say that I am not a native of Easton, but Easton has been my home for

the last 35 years.

During those years I have come to know and love the city. When I first came to Easton in the '40s it was quite a town. I have seen it go down and I also have witnessed it trying to pull itself up by its bootstraps.
